OBJECTIVES

1. To relieve hardship, need or distress, relieve sickness and advance education among internally displaced Kachin people.
2. To advance public education in the difficulties experienced by refugees as well as deprived and needy Kachin people.
3. To promote fundamental human right education base on the United Nation's Universal Declaration of Human Rights and documentation of human rights abuses.

Activities

1. To provide short term relief aid to Kachin internally displaced people (IDPs) living along the Kachin State and China border, and those who displaced with Kachin State.
2. To work closely with Kachin relief workers in providing such aid.
3. To provide financial grants to buy basic medical equipment for IDP clinics and hospitals.
4. To provide emergency medical referral and hospitalization cost for the internal displaced people (IDPs) in the Chinese hospitals.
5. To provide grants for construction of schools and study materials.
6. To fund short term medical and education projects
7. To support legal cost for victims of civil, human rights violations and support human rights awareness program.
8. To provide the information resources for issues relating to relief assistance and human rights abuses.
9. To work closely with the organizations which we shared a common goal for our mutual benefits.

10. To evaluate annual works and reassess the best working strategy for future project.

AREA OF BENEFIT

The border of Burma and China, and the inside Kachin State in Northern Burma.

AREA OF CONCERN

The Kachin Relief Fund's projects can be briefly classified into six categories.

1. Education
2. Healthcare
3. Welfare
4. Awareness
5. Advocacy
6. Networking

The Kachin Relief Fund is non-profit registered charity organization in England and Wales, made up of Kachin exiles who come from the area where the refugees are. We know the area; we know the people, and the local community groups. We can make sure that the right aid reaches the right people as quickly as possible, with cost effective way as possible.

The recipients of our funds can be classified into three main categories:

1. The internally displaced people (IDPs) in the Kachin State and China border and are living in the IDP camps.
2. The schools in least developed area (Sumpra Bum, N-Gum La and Putao etc.) of North-Eastern Kachin State, the territories within non-government controlled areas.
3. The organizations working inside Kachin State to promote the human rights education and capacity building for local civil societies.

TRUSTEES' ACTIVITIES

The charity is managed by a group of trustees who have been implementing activities in line with the objectives of the charity. The trustees make a yearly plan for its charity work according to the budget and requirements for the plight of the local people. The trustees also respond to emergency situations depending on the local situation and requests from local civil societies.

The AGM also re-appointed and elected the new trustee member for next three years effective from 22nd September 2014 to 31st August 2017.

Mr. Mungringla Bawmwang and Mrs. Nang Awng Maran have completed their term and requested not to be re-appointed as trustee members. We thank them for their volunteer services during their term.

The KRF Secretary visited Myitkyina, Kachin State from 31st July 2014 to 14th August 2014. The trip was a personal family visit but he kindly offered his spare-time to engage in the Charity's work since it was difficult to travel to Myitkyina for other trustee members. During the trip, the KRF secretary managed to meet with the local NGOs and individual contacts to implement the charity's objects.

The Secretary met the family members of Brang Yung, Lahpai Gam and La Ring in Shwezet IDP camp. They were arbitrary arrested, tortured and wrongly imprisoned for several years, accused them of violating the Article 17/1 of the 1908 Unlawful Associations Act. The KRF have donated Kyats 100,000 each to their families due to hardships that they faced. The KRF have been sponsoring the lawyers their cases to appeal at the Supreme Court.

The KRF secretary also met director of the Education Department in Northern Division, Kachin State. The KRF have sponsored his trip to Democratic Education Conference held on July 2014 in the South Korea. This was a follow-up support after our trustee Gumring Gun's visit to the area. He expressed his appreciation for sponsoring the exposure trip and he will put some of his experiences into practice.

The KRF secretary also visited three Early Child Care (Pre-School) centres in Myitkyina. It was first time for the KRF to visit Early Child Care centres under the Burmese government controlled administration in Kachin State. Despite the UNICEF and the Burmese Government support (by one time donation) for one of local childcare centre, KRF learnt that they had no regular support and struggling for basic needs. The teacher expressed urgent need for proper toilets where they were using the bamboo hut children toilets. The KRF have donated two squat toilets system, and learning support material for three childcare centres.

The KRF secretary met Reverend Sabaw Sinwa Naw, Director of Christian Education, discussed for development of faith based Primary/Secondary Education, a model to Church of England Schools and Academies in England.

KRF learnt that the Border Guard Force NDA(K) militia's top officer has been committing the "land confiscation" from local people using his proxy agent in Myitkyina. The KRF secretary met nine villagers who were the victims of land grabbing. The KRF secretary met their lawyer and discussed case development and also requested a local NGO to take full documentation of such case.

Ms. Lahpai Seng Raw, a founder of Metta Development Foundation encouraged our secretary to visit Metta's seventy acres agricultural development project site "Metta's Alam CARD Centre, The Centre for Action Research and Demonstration (CARD)", which was a residential institution for learning and research, established in Alam village, Kachin state. Since Food Security would be a top priority for the Kachin State people, KRF have learned a great accomplishment of Metta's work for the region since it was established in 2001. The CARD centre was also used for a short and long term training of trainer's courses for Metta's partners and network from all over the Burma. The KRF have proposed to sponsor three students in coming Farmer-Led Extension (FLE) Course on Sustainable Agriculture in this CARD centre. The humanitarian relief mission, a 'hand out aid' would not be sustainable in long run. Thus this visit recommended that the agricultural project for the IDPs' self-reliance and food security should be next option for the KRF project.

Mr. Gumring Hkangda, a trustee, undertook a trip, funded by the KRF, to various internally displaced people (IDP) camps and met the local partners from 16th February 2014 to 4th May 2014. During his three months visit, he covered many areas, most importantly to a place called N-Gum La in Northern Kachin State. This is very remote part of Northern Kachin State and thousands of children in that area have been relying on N-Gum La High School for their high school education.

With careful consideration from our fact-finding trip and the requests from the local organizations, the KRF's AGM decided to focus on four main tasks within our scope for 2014-2015.

1. The KRF to grant funding for implementation of Sport Education/Activities in Mai Ja Yang.
2. The KRF to grant funding for construction of N-Gum La High School library.
3. The KRF to continue to support human rights issues and documentation.
4. The KRF to consider any urgent request for humanitarian assistance/ crisis faced by the students during their academic year.

There is a limit on funding due to the financial constraints on KRF but regular funding within our resources has been applied in the charity's yearly plan. When an emergency

situation arises, we increased our donation responses to upper limit of our donation using a reserved amount.

Every grant the charity made has taken the consensus from every trustee members and discussed before a grant has been made to a recipient. The majority of grants were made according to the yearly plan. The KRF is always committed to make sure that our donations reaches the right people as quickly and cost effectively as possible.

VISIT TO THE IDP CAMPS & NETWORKING

Our objects of visit to the IDP camps remained the same. The objects of the charity visit are the following;

1. To obtain up-to-date information on the humanitarian situation.
2. Visit to the IDPs in remote areas for fact finding humanitarian situation on the ground, major gaps, challenges and scopes, and recommendations to the humanitarian aids donors and stakeholders.
3. To develop KRF's strategy to achieve its objectives.
4. To find out effectiveness of the funding by the UN relief agencies, INGOs as well as the projects supported by DFID's partners INGOs in our coverage areas.
5. To meet representatives of local Non-Governmental Organisations in order to strengthen existing and potential networks of support for KRF partners.

2014 marks the 3rd anniversary of resumed war in Kachin State. The war resumed in 2011, many civilians have been killed and about ten percent of entire Kachin population have been internally displaced. Whilst the people in other parts of Burma can do more for their education and the economic development, more than 100,000 Kachin IDPs are still living in limbo in the IDP camps, fighting for life security, no access to education and daily survival. The KRF has been assisting them with the resources it has in partnership with local organizations and individuals.

GRANT MAKING POLICY

We mainly focused on four main categories when responding accordance with the objects of charity.

1. Emergency relief responses
2. Education for children
3. Health for the IDP
4. Advocacy, activities & awareness to promote of human rights.

GRANT FOR EDUCATION

More than 80% of our funding are allocated to support education, welfare and development projects. The charity believes that education is important for the next generation, as many children in the Internally Displaced People's (IDP) camps have been struggling for a stable education, especially soon after the war broke out on June 9th, 2011. The Burmese Army broke a 17-year ceasefire causing massive displacement of civilians; the fighting intensified in the administrative territories under the Kachin Independence Organization's (KIO). There has been no political improvement in Kachin State since our last report, however more IDPs were added into the current figures. Unlike previous years, the KRF have moved the target areas to assist to Northern Kachin State and Northern Shan State, with one exceptional for human rights cases to cover throughout Kachin State and Kachin Sub-State in Northern Shan State.

The KRF have received a proposal from Education Department of the Northern Division administration to grant funding for Early Childhood Development [ECD] programme in N-Gum La, Npawng Hkyet, Kachyi Htu, Nraw Kawng, Kum Boi Uma and Share Uma villages. The KRF have granted £6,737 and have delivered necessary items for the ECD programme through our local network. With the proposal from Wunpawng Ninghtoi, the KRF have delivered 449 school uniforms for the Kachin IDP students from Northern Shan State, studying in the boarding school in Mai Ja Yang.

The KRF believes that it is important to transfer knowledge, therefore sponsoring teachers from the schools in remote areas. The KRF committed to sponsor nine teachers to study at Mai Ja Yang Teacher Training College (TTC). The following teachers have enrolled at Mai Ja Yang TTC for 2014-2015 academic year.

During Mr. Gumring Gun, visit to the IDP camps, he had opportunity to network with Prop Roots Education Centre in Dehong of Yunnan Province in China side of the border. The Prop Roots Program is to empower Jingpo children with their own cultural, their own creativity. We are looking for possible future cooperation that came up through brain storming during this meeting. The KRF donated 500 RMB to support their activities. Please see the letter below:

Prop Roots Program

Following Gumring Gun's visit to N-Gum La, we have received a funding proposal for N-Gum La High School library and a decision for funding has decided in the AGM meeting on 6th July 2014.

GRANT FOR HEALTHCARE

The KRF trustees decided to focus funding to remote areas because there was reasonably good collaboration between the INGOs and local NGOs to reach IDP populations in Eastern Kachin State.

The KRF received minimum requests for improvement of hospital facilities and urgent medical referral cases unlike previous years. However, the KRF donated ten set of small oxygen pex, three big oxygen pex, three minor surgery set, three surgery atetric slingth, two standing fans to use in surgery room and one computer set for the IDP camp, which were requested by Kachin Women's Association in Laiza.

A minor setback for this reporting year was that despite concern for a budget constraint, the charity could have done better to help healthcare sector in the Eastern Kachin State.

GRANT FOR HUMAN RIGHTS PROMOTING ACTIVITIES

We continued to support victims of arbitrary detention, human rights documentation, and assisting with legal and travel expense for the local volunteer human right lawyers.

Brang Yung, Lahpai Gam and La Ring's cases, the innocent victims arrested and imprisoned under Article 17/1 of the 1908 Unlawful Association Act. Their cases are still ongoing since 2012 and we are supporting their lawyers to be able to represent their cases in the high court. The cases have been exhausted in Myitkyina District court therefore to challenge and to prove their innocent, the family members and Kachin societies wanted to bring their cases to Naypyidaw Supreme Court hearing. The KRF have granted funding for the expenses to take that case into Supreme Court in Naypyidaw.

Brang Yung, Lahpai Gam and La Ring's cases are almost exhausted to use a domestic legal remedy. It is a principle of international law that protection of human rights should be carried out by Burmese government, though direct interference on the cases from the Burmese military make impossible to provide fair trial for the innocent victims. Further submission of their cases to the Supreme Court in Naypyidaw was accepted on 5th May 2014. A review of their cases were held on June 2014 then followed by the argument for their cases have set to 16 Dec 2014. We are hoping that the innocent victims to get justice, release very soon and reunite with their family members in Shwezet IDP camp (Swezet Church premise), Myitkyina, Kachin State.

The charity also has partially contributed for "The Kachin Civilian Defender 2014", an annual prize award organized by Union of Kachin Communities in Europe (UKCE). This award has created to show our respect to our forefathers and fallen heroes who were protecting our lands, cultural heritage, language and religion. The criteria for this award goes to any Kachin national civilian or organisation, which work tirelessly to defend land, its people and culture. The Kachin Peace Network, the organization based in Rangoon, Burma, promoting peace, security and campaigning for the civilians trapped in the conflict zones, won the ward in 2014.

EMERGENCY RELIEF RESPONSES

We have received news on Saturday, 16th November 2013 that the Burmese troops attacked the IDP camps and has set up military camp around the Nam Lim Pa Boarding School, which is hosting 700 students and 34 teachers.

This latest battle has also affected the internally displaced persons (IDPs) located around the area, affecting at least 2,300 persons (including Nam Lim Pa villagers). The IDPs there have been displaced; fled from there again means this is their second displacement. The IDPs are moving away from the camp and into surrounding areas.

We have received email update from Wunpawng Ninghtoi (WPN), a local NGO said *“since last night at 17:30 local time, fighting continue in Mahkaw Yang and Kawng Ja village. The IDPs still running to the jungles, some of them arrive in Gawng Ngu Yang and over 153 students and over 100 IDPs, totally over 200 IDPs just safely arrived Lagat Yang”*. We need medicines urgently. Many IDPs have suffered cold, cough and some of them are frustrated and very weak. The KRF responded with £2,000 to be able to use in any emergency need for the IDPs through the WPN.

To response to a proposal from the relief team in Northern Kachin State, the KRF has delivered two hundred winter clothes for IDP children and one hundred rice sacks from Myitkyina to support the teachers at five IDP schools in December 2013.

ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES

The KRF has no paid officials. All public relations, secretarial and financial accounting work is done by volunteers.

Hkun Htoi Layang, secretary of the charity, maintains the KRF’s website on a voluntary basis.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 21st SEPTEMBER 2014

1. Accounting Policies

a) Basis of Accounts

The financial statements have been prepared on the historic cost basis in accordance with relevant standards and provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP2005) issued by the Charity Commission. The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

b) Income

c) Value Added Tax

The Charity is not registered for VAT and accordingly, where applicable, expenditure is disclosed inclusive of VAT.

d) Expenditure

Direct charitable expenditure comprises all expenditure relating to the objects of the charity including the costs of supporting the charity's activities.

Other expenditure comprises fund raising and publicity costs and expenditure on management and administration of the charity.

Where expenditure cannot be directly attributed to a single activity, it is allocated between activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

e) Unrestricted Funds

The Charity's unrestricted funds consist of general reserves which the charity may use for its purpose at its discretion.

f) Restricted Funds

Restricted Funds are those where the donor has imposed restrictions on the use of the fund which are legally binding. Income arising on restricted funds and expenditure incurred in respect of these funds are reflected through the statement of financial activities in the appropriate column with any surpluses or deficits being appropriated to/from restricted funds.
